College also has got a website of its own, for displaying information related to different college activities. College uploads the academic calendar and master timetable on the website for information of Faculty and students. Reports of all co curricular and extracurricular activities are also uploaded on the website. Information related to major and minor exams is also uploaded on the website. Other activities related to library utilization, student attendance, I card distribution, certificate distribution, student events, etc. are managed through online mode only partially. #### **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

College being a constituent college of the Cluster University of Jammu follows the curriculum developed as per the guidelines of CLUJ, for different subjects. Senior faculty members of college from different subjects are given due representation in the Board of Studies for the development /revision of the curriculum. The curriculum is intimated to the college through regular circulars and through the University website. Students can download their syllabi from University Website for their reference. Subject teachers also share copies of syllabi taught by them in their assigned classes. Every effort is undertaken to ensure an integrated and comprehensive curriculum delivery to the students in the following ways: 1. College follows the academic calendar of CLUJ, which is prepared by the University under the broader guidelines of the J&K Higher education department. 2. Principal holds meetings with the HODs and the Conveners of various committees to discuss the action plans for execution of the academic calendar. 3. Timetable committee of the college designs a master timetable, keeping in view the academic calendar, subject combinations, and infrastructure available. 4. Time table is intimated to different Departments through circulars for further implementation. 5. HODs hold the departmental meetings and frame their individual timetables as per the time slots in the Master timetable. 6. Objective -driven teaching plan is formulated by each department as per the given curriculum and timetable. The expected course outcomes are achieved through collective efforts undertaken by the faculty with an in-depth study of the subject. 7. Library facilities are made available with updated books, journals, e-journals, internet, INFLIBNET, etc. 8. Modern innovative teaching techniques in addition to conventional methods are adopted to enhance the teaching-learning process like group discussions, quiz, online lectures, PowerPoint presentations, charts, models, etc. 9. Well- equipped laboratories have been established for students to carry out practicals. 10. EDUSAT-HUB, Seminar room, and Smart classroom have been

Department holds meetings at frequent intervals to assess curriculum coverage and any difficulties students and teachers may face in the classes. 12. Report of these meetings is shared with the Principal for any remedial measures. 13. During the last few months of the session, when colleges were closed due to COVID-pandemic, the college made sure to continue class work through online mode. 14. E-content was shared with the students for the continuous flow of knowledge. 15. For the effective delivery and time-bound completion of prescribed courses, a timely beginning of classwork and in-time completion of the syllabus is ensured by the College. 16. The college examination committee ensures timely completion of Internal Assessment exams and their evaluation along with preparation of award rolls and their final checking by the University officials. 17. During the last semester of the year in view of the COVID pandemic, online exams were conducted to avoid the delay in course

completion and save precious time for students.

ragging committee also receive feedback from students through class campaigns. During the last few months of the year when due to COVID pandemic classwork was shifted to online mode, students were encouraged to send their complaints, suggestions, or feedback directly to their concerned teachers, HODs of different departments, and Principal, via Whatsapp or email. Teachers are important stakeholders in any academic institution. Teachers' feedback is sought in different staff meetings held in the college from time to time. They also have the opportunity to send their feedback through their respective HODs. During the Staff Council/BOS Meetings, teachers give their suggestions for the implementation of new/revised pedagogic strategies and programmes. Teachers also provide formal as well as informal feedback to the head of the institution on different academic, administrative, and other affairs related to the college. The received feedback is analyzed by IQAC and suggestions are provided to the Head of the Institution for action. Alumni feedback is also obtained by the IQAC during Alumni meet organized every year. During the Alumni meet, the executive body stressed the improvement in the teaching-learning process, to impart social and moral values, smart class teaching, etc. The college organizes Parent-Teacher meet from time to time. This practice has been appreciated by the parents as it creates a bond between the parents and the institution. Feedback sought from different stakeholders is scrutinized and thus utilized for quality enhancement, and improvement in various aspects such as curriculum enrichment, infrastructure augmentation, etc. During the year based on feedback received from different stakeholders few initiatives were taken by institutions: 1) Conversion of ten classrooms from normal classrooms to ICT classrooms was initiated. In this direction purchasing of all equipment was done during the year. 2) Teachers were directed to send e-content to students in the form of audio, video lectures, and notes on specific topics for better understanding, in addition to the online lectures.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words) Mentoring in an educational institution is a collaborative relationship between a teacher and student with the goal of personal and professional development of the student. The teacher provides guidance to the student in a congenial atmosphere for better comprehension. The main aims of this type of Mentor/Mentee system is a) To bridge the gap between students and teachers b) To take the lead in supporting mentee through a one to one relationship, c)To build a relationship of trust by caring and planning for the welfare of the mentee. d) To serve as a positive role model. This system also helps the students in their academic pursuits by a) by encouraging them to attend classes, b) Motivating them to complete courses c) Helping in selecting skill courses d) Arranging remedial coaching for week students e) By arranging study material for economically poor students. In our college, each Department follows the Mentor-Mentee Program in which a group of students is assigned to a teacher who mentors them. All faculty members of different Departments, under the guidance of their respective HODs, are given the responsibility of different sections in the case of Arts and Commerce stream and practical groups in the case of Science subjects. Teachers in charge of 1JK NCC, 2JKNCC, and Naval wings of our college provide mentoring to their respective cadets to help them to group into disciplined and patriotic citizens. Our college has an NSS unit and mentoring of these volunteers is done by the teacher in charge of this NSS unit who instills in them a sense of scial responsibility. Students meet their Mentor on a frequent basis to discuss any problem they are facing. The Mentors keep track of their grades, guide them for improving their results. The academic calendar of the college is prepared keeping in view the guidelines of the cluster university of Jammu. The admission for 1st semester of UG and PG programmes started from the first week of July. Regular classwork of semester 1st of UG and PG programme started from 3rd week of July. Internal assessment test for semester 1st of UG and PG programmes held in the month of August and October respectively. The internal practical examination and external practical examination were held in the month of October and November respectively. End semester examinations of semester 1st held in the month of November. Regular classwork of semester 3rd of UG and PG programme started from 3rd week of July. Internal assessment test for semester 3rd of UG and PG programmes held in the month of August and September respectively. The internal practical examination

and external practical examination were held in the month of September and October r respectively. End semester examinations of semester 3rd are held in the month of November. Regular classwork of semester 5th of UG and PG programme started from 3rd week of July. Internal assessment test for semester 5th of UG and PG programmes held in the month of August and September respectively. The internal practical examination and external practical examination were held in the month of September and October respectively. End semester examinations of semester 5th are held in the month of November. The even semesters start from the second week of January and the duration of even semesters is from January to May but due to pandemic, there were changes in the academic calendar from the last week of March onwards. Internal practical examinations were conducted online by giving assignments from the practical performed before the lockdown period. The internal assessment test of semesters 2nd, 4th and 6th in respect of those students who have not appeared earlier in the month of March 2020 or have failed was held online. The faculty members were directed to assign online home assignments for the end semester examination to the students of the 2nd and 4th semesters through Whatsapp/GCR mode. The end semester examination for the 6th semester was held in the month of September in offline mode. The second phase (online/offline) of the 6th-semester examination was held in the month of October for those students who had missed their first phase examinations held in the month of September.

available for proper maintenance of laboratories and equipments. College library with huge collection of text-books, reference books, large number of journals, periodicals, newspapers etc. is the biggest resource for faculty and students. Library committee is responsible for maintenance and utilization of the library. For best use of books, students are directed to return the books within fifteen days from the date of issue. For safety of books pesticide and fungicide treatment is done in the library at frequent intervals. The College

Hostel is looked after by hostel warden along with College Hostel Committee, which ensures up-gradation and maintenance of available infrastructure facilities.Sports committee ensures proper utilization and up-keeping of sports equipment and Gymnasium. College has got sufficient IT infrastructure. Regular assessment of computer equipment and infrastructure is done. Computer Department looks after the system software maintenance and minor hardware issues. For all major computer related issues external service providers are hired. Computers are regularly updated with latest software and anti-virus for providing efficient IT facility to students and faculty members. College has a Development committee headed by its convener, who receives complaints and suggestions regarding any repair work. A team of electrician, plumber and carpenter is available to resolve routine problems. For any major repair work and maintenance, external agencies are hired in consultation with the Principal. Damaged furniture and equipment are written off with proper procedure. New furniture and equipments are purchased by College Purchase Committee after receiving requisition from different departments and student representatives. Repairing and whitewash works are timely done for maintenance of buildings. Housekeeping staff with the assistance of Jammu Municipal Corporation help in maintaining cleanliness in the campus. The maintenance work of toilet blocks, fire extinguishers, electric work, plumbing, RO-water facilities, water tank, etc. is also carried out frequently.

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

To encourage student participation in the development of the institution and to address their grievances, the college has a democratically elected student council/association. This student council is elected through the election

process in the classrooms of all semesters. One class representative is elected in each section of Communication English and Environmental studies for semester 1st. For the 3rd and 5th semesters, the election is held in different major sections, which represent maximum students from different subject combinations. The class representatives are elected at the start of the session, in open voting in their selected sections. These class representatives participate in the election of the Presidium of college. The Presidium consists of a President, Vice President, Head Girl, Cultural Secretary, etc. The election to the College Presidium is conducted in accordance with the Rules of Election governed by the College statutes. The college Presidium members are elected from among the class representatives, through the secret ballot. This election is held under the supervision of the student welfare committee of the college. This student welfare Committee is empowered to promote and facilitate student activities of the college. The Student Council primarily acts as an important link between the college administration and students. College student council facilitates students to engage themselves effectively in co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the College and provides opportunities for training as good citizens. All students' related activities are carried out under the leadership of the College Presidium, advised and facilitated by the staff members. The Student Council provides its suggestions with regard to academics, development, and other activities in the college. The college administration periodically organizes meetings with representatives of the Student Council with regard to various issues confronting the college. These include issues pertaining to academics, maintenance of discipline within the campus, organization of co-circular activities, organization of debates and seminars, the conduct of tours and exposure visits, etc. The college administration takes due cognizance of suggestions and observations of students in these council meetings. Due consideration is given to these suggestions before framing future policies for the future. All important decisions are taken in the combined meetings of the student executive members, class representatives, and association secretaries, which are convened regularly. Apart from the college union, the activities of clubs and forums like NSS, NCC, Women's cell, Debate and Oratory Club, Quiz Club, Nature club, etc. are coordinated by the students along with the faculty coordinators. They act as a link between society and college administration. The Student Council participates in various academic and administrative activities during the year. The college student council in consultation with the Cultural Committee of the college organized major events, such as Investiture Ceremony, Youth festival, Sports festival, National events like Gandhi Jayanti, Guru Nanak Jayanti, a celebration of Independence Day, and Republic Day with great enthusiasm. The student council also helped to organize co-curricular and extension activities on platforms like Discussion forums, Inter-college debate competitions, Essay

competitions, and plantation drive with the support of the Eco club of the college.

#### 6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

• Decentralization: The college believes in inclusiveness and decentralized governance and participative management. The Principal of the institution is the overall in charge of academic, non academic and administrative activities of the institution. The administrative responsibilities have been divided among the faculty members and non-teaching staff as per protocol. At the start of the session various committees like IQAC, admission, examination, hostel, library, sports, cultural, NSS, NCC, purchase, discipline, were framed, for execution of different academic and administrative tasks and to maintain transparency. Senior faculty members are overall in charge of these committees. With the constitution of committees staff members are involved into decision taking roles and participative operation of institution. IQAC is entrusted with the responsibility of overall quality matters. Its chief function is to initiate, plan and supervise various activities that are necessary to increase quality of education imparted in the college. All the staff members meet, discuss and share their opinion to plan different events. Further decentralization is done at departmental level were faculty from different subjects work under the headship of senior most faculty member to plan, implement, and conduct activities in their respective departments. They work under overall supervision of the Principal. They conduct departmental meetings at frequent intervals to devise a strategy for overall working of their respective departments. The head of each department is given responsibility for implementation of the respective curriculum. They also oversee paper setting, moderation, evaluation and submission of internal assessment. They prepare their individual departmental time tables as per the Master time table of college and distribute different courses among the faculty members for further execution. They are also empowered to form strategy for future development of the department and plan various activities like seminars, workshops, extension lectures, field trips etc. along with other faculty members. • Participative management : The institute encourages a culture of participative management by involving the staff and students in various activities. Both students and faculties are allowed to express themselves. They are encouraged to give suggestions to improve the excellence in any aspect of the Institute. The Principal and the staff members are involved in defining the policies, procedures, framing guidelines, rules regulations pertaining to admission, placement, discipline, grievance, counselling, training, library services etc. to effectively implement the same to ensure smooth and systematic functioning of the institute. Account section and different purchase committees are involved in preparation of annual budget of the institute. Faculty members also publish joint research papers and share their knowledge. The Principal of the institution is in charge of academic, non academic and administrative activities of the institution. On behalf of the institution, she interacts and corresponds with Higher Education Department JK, UGC, Affiliating University, etc. All the staff members actively participate in implementing the policies, procedures, and framework in order to maintain and achieve the quality standards. The institution ensures every possible way for the smooth conduct of the teaching. A fully equipped seminar hall is there where seminars, lectures, FDPs, workshops, conferences etc. are held regularly for the benefit of the students, teachers and non-teaching staff so that every stake holder of the college gets a chance to learn, explore and update themselves. The assessment involves practical field work as well as industrial visits. During last few months of year due to COVID lockdown, online classes are conducted via Zoom, Google Classroom, Wise App, Google Meet
